News from the Parish Council

The Parish Council have agreed a mission statement for its work going forward:

'The Parish council is a local authority that makes decisions on behalf of the people in the parish and has an overall responsibility for the well-being of its local community. It is the level of government closest to the community, with the district authority above it in the hierarchy. As it is the authority closest to the people, parish councils are invariably the first-place people will go with concerns or ideas. For this reason, they are a vital part of any community:

- representing the local community
- delivering services to meet local needs
- striving to improve quality of life in the parish'

Ideas for improving the village were discussed and will be revisited at the next meeting.

It was noted that the issue of dog fouling around the play area was of concern to the parishioners. The council felt that a quote should be obtained (as a guide) to fence the play area to reduce dog fouling.

A Working Group to celebrate the Coronation on 6 May 2023 was discussed. It is understood that the School is planning for the day, children's event/ picnic in the afternoon, adults event in the evening. The Council agreed to support this initiative and if needed should be prepared to contribute.

The Council is aware that grass cutting around the village has not been carried out in accordance with the current contract and this is being pursued whilst an alternative supplier is also being sought.

A Report was received from the Churchyard Conservation Working Group on their clear up day on the 27th October:

Although it was rather wet, seven volunteers cleared a large area on the left of the path from the war memorial to the tower, a smaller area on the right of the path, the length of the path and along the south side of the Church, as well as removing the ivy from both the south and east walls. The arisings and waste plant material were put in the far-right corner – about 14 builders sacks of 'grass', two sacks of brambles and nettles, and a trug of ivy. The right-hand side of the path and the south and east sides for the Church were finished off the next weekend.


The plan is to keep the area around the bench clear and tidy. (A wild rose growing next to a gravestone to the left of the bench). It was thought perhaps we could plant some low maintenance plants here such as lavender and rosemary (suggestions welcome).

SAM Report

The SAM2 unit was Kettlestone Road from September to November 2022 monitoring traffic speed and the volume of vehicles travelling towards the school. From 12 September 2022 to 28 November 2022:

- 8.835 vehicles were recorded with an average of 305 per day.
- The peak times of travel are 8 am to 9 am (average of 35 vehicles); and 3 pm to 4 pm (average of 31 vehicles)
- The maximum speed was 70 mph at 8:10 am on 27 September, (although the average speeder was travelling 23 mph).
- The majority of vehicles were travelling below the speed limit which is 30 mph. The 85 th percentile speed (i.e. of 7,510 vehicles) was 29.6 mph: and the average speed was 23 mph.
